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Chairman's Report



To say that this year has been one of consolidation for the New Zealand Farm Environment Trust (NZFE Trust) is, I believe, far too modest as a statement. By any measure the Trust has enjoyed a very successful year with regional and national awards competitions and ceremonies continuing to be very popular, well supported and above all providing a platform for farmers to demonstrate to other farmers and the community what sustainable farming looks like.

I mention the word consolidation because we have to a large extent as a Trust built on the platform of the hard work and strategic thinking of the Trustees of earlier years under the passionate leadership of Jim Cotman. A new Chairman and three new Trustees has tested the succession planning of the organisation but with Jim working in an advisory role for six months and the 'old hands' around the table assisting it has been business as usual. It is also of course a tribute to our General Manager David Natzke and Executive Administrator Clare Rosser that the transition of a new Chair, etc has been seamless.

The founding region of the Ballance Farm Environment Awards, Waikato, celebrated its 20th anniversary during the year which gave us all a chance to reflect on the humble beginnings of the organisation and the progress made. The activities of the NZFE Trust are now a large undertaking involving hundreds of volunteers, contestants and paid staff. We are very fortunate that our committed family of sponsors provide the financial support to make it all happen along with much moral and physical help as well.

To summarise the year, at high level we have come in on budget, delivered a small surplus and entry numbers were maintained. The regional and national award ceremonies were a highlight and our sponsors

have indicated that their future on-going support will continue.

The NZFE Trust is in a good position at this point in time but there is no room for complacency as many challenges lie ahead. One of the highlights for the coming year will be the addition of the Taranaki region to the competition to bring our regional areas to ten. We hope to include the remaining regions in the future and this growth highlights the need and challenge of remaining lean and efficient as our size increases.

Operating Environment

In the wider picture, the activities and the aims and objectives have never been needed more. The scrutiny from our customers and our community continues as does our ability to measure the impact farming activities have on the land. Financial pressures and market signals have led to wide scale intensification of land use with affordable irrigation leading to higher stock concentration and high yielding crops. There are many irrigation schemes in the planning stage and the potential to create long lasting wealth for all New Zealanders is immense. It would be a travesty if as a country we do not realise these opportunities and miss the opportunities that world markets offer. Recreational and environmental groups and our customers have legitimate concerns about intensive farming's footprint. It is up to agriculture and horticulture to meet the reasonable concerns of these groups and our Ballance Farm Environmental Award contestants prove this can be done. This is the NZFE Trust's vital role, practical non-theoretical farmers proving it can be done and providing an example that can be followed by others.

Because of the foresight and skill of the previous governance of the NZFE Trust over the years of existence it has evolved to be at the centre of the discussion around sustainability and leading the charge on showcasing and promoting sustainability. The NZFE Trust's widespread coverage of New Zealand and crucially, its comprehensive and independent judging processes, places it at the forefront of the debate. It is in fact a heavy responsibility but one which we relish because the goal is so worthwhile.

Ballance Farm Environment Awards

At the centre of the NZFE Trust's activities are the regional awards; they continue to be well supported and the regional award functions continue to progress in all respects. Some of our regions are attracting three hundred guests to their award evenings, the quality of the entries is always improving and the judging process is continuously being refined to make it fair and comprehensive and importantly, to give value back to the farmer entrants. In this last regard the chance to benchmark performance remains a key motivation for our entrants so consistent and expert judging is vital. We are very fortunate to have Jamie Strang, our National Judging Coordinator guiding the ship. Jamie's selfless commitment to his role provides the glue that our judging teams require to remain enthused and delivering such good results.

Each region has a Judging Coordinator, Regional Coordinator and Committee Chair and their associated committee; a lot of people, very little money, a lot of work and a great product. The composition of these hard working bodies is unique in rural New Zealand. Regional Council staff work alongside bankers and other rural professionals from our sponsor family to deliver the competition. The support of Regional Councils along with the Gisborne District Council is a vital element to the success of the awards and of course meeting our joint objectives in terms of promoting sustainability.

National Sustainability Showcase

The 2013 event was held in Hamilton, appropriately as the birth place of the awards 20 years ago. The guests included many agri-business leaders, farmers and agricultural supporters. The Hon Nathan Guy, Minister for Primary Industries gave the key note address and presented the Gordon Stephenson Trophy to our national winners. The Minister and his Ministry's on-going support is greatly appreciated.

Another key activity at Showcase time is the personal leadership development programme run over three days prior to the awards function and immediately after the final round of judging for our nine regional Supreme Winners. These regional

winners heard inspiring addresses from a number of leaders and I know none of them will forget Gordon Stephenson's address, notable for its passion, its clarity of thought and humility.

Previous Supreme Winners have said that the chance to mix and share knowledge and experience with fellow contestants is an absolute highlight of the competition for them. This is why 60 past winners also gathered together on the day of the National Sustainability Showcase to discuss the development of an Alumni of Supreme Winners. Good progress was made and this coming year should see the formalisation of the group in some form. There are many possible options as to the future role of the Alumni and its relationship with the NZFE Trust. Nothing is 'off the table' and it was very exciting to see so many leaders in farm sustainability gathering together around Showcase time. The NZFE Trust is committed to providing on-going support to an Alumni. The knowledge the leadership within that group is immense and environmentally well qualified to take the sustainability message to a very wide

The wide scale use of precision technologies is a feature of the Mackenzie's operations. For example, electromagnetic soil mapping allows a clear picture of water holding and productive capacity and this, combined with variable rate irrigation on centre pivots, has enabled water savings of up to 50%.

Craige and Roz are deserved winners of the Gordon Stephenson Trophy and they will make great ambassadors for New Zealand farming. Just as the 2012 winners, Blair and Jane Smith did, Craige and Roz will travel overseas to countries of their choice and will participate in many events and seminars across the country. With help from our sponsors and

partners they will also travel throughout New Zealand with General Manager David Natzke to gain the widest possible knowledge of New Zealand agriculture whilst at the same time promoting sustainable agriculture. One of the highlights will be presenting to the Primary Production Select Committee. They will then produce a report on their findings in their chosen area of study.

Blair and Jane focussed their studies on marketing primary produce in Korea, Taiwan and China and produced an insightful and thoroughly readable report "Good Morning Asia". Their report can be found on our website at www.bfea.org.nz and has deservedly been hailed for its quality both by industry leaders and farmers in general.

Blair and Jane's trip was arranged and supported by MPI, Beef + Lamb New Zealand and Fonterra.

Building Dairy Environment Leaders Programme

The 2012 programme was held in Southland with 60 top New Zealand dairy farmers attending for a three day session. The aim was to challenge their thinking around environmental issues, the way the industry is facing up to the challenges and to encourage leadership on behalf of fellow farmers. The programme was popular and successful but will be the last in the series as DairyNZ, the funder of the programme, is making strategic changes in this area of their activities. The NZFE Trust will continue to have a role in this new programme but in a much revised format.

Beef + Lamb New Zealand Environment Leaders Programme

A successful inaugural Beef + Lamb New Zealand programme was held in Wellington for 20 beef and lamb farmers. Beef + Lamb New Zealand have indicated they wish to continue funding for next year and the NZFE Trust and Beef + Lamb New Zealand will no doubt work together to further enhance the quality of the offering to a new group of environmental leaders.

Sponsors, Partners and Strategic Partners of the NZFE Trust

The NZFE Trust is truly blessed by the quality and stature of our family of supporters. These organisations have put one hand up to signal their support for the NZFE Trust and the other deep into their pockets to ensure we are able to do our work. I encourage you to read their comments in this Annual Report; they are obviously very in tune with the aims and objectives of the NZFE Trust.

We have a full and stable line up of sponsors which we hope will continue and will of course look forward to welcoming the Taranaki Regional Council's support in 2014 as we take the awards to that powerful farming region.

Thank you all for your support be it friendship, skills and/or money. We cannot deliver without it.

Finally

The longer I am in the role of Chairman the more I appreciate the skills of my predecessor Jim Cotman, so many of the processes and initiatives that Jim set in motion are continuing on or gathering momentum. He left the organisation in fine shape and the current governance team is determined not to drop the ball.

One of Jim's most successful tactics was to allow the NZFE Trust General Manager David Natzke to get on with his job and this he certainly does. Thank you David on behalf of the NZFE Trust for the commitment, the wisdom and professionalism you bring to the role. We are extremely fortunate to have you.

Another feature of the year has been development of our executive team with Clare Rosser joining David as Executive Administrator, a role that she has relished and made a complete success.

Thanks also must go to all those in the Regions that serve on or chair the committees, work as judges or regional coordinators. You are not forgotten but never thanked enough and obviously you are the strength of the organisation.

To my fellow Trustees, thank you for your patient support as I learn the ropes and a special thank you to our Treasurer, Joanne van Polanen and Simon Saunders, our Deputy Chair for his unfailing support and astute contribution over a wide range of important issues including the National Winners judging.

It has also been very rewarding to work with our family of sponsors particularly Larry Bilodeau from Ballance Agri-Nutrients in his role as a Trustee where he pays us the highest compliment by devoting so much of his time to the NZFE Trust's activities. There are many challenges ahead for the NZFE Trust and plenty of work to do but I am positive we can make a success of what is in front of us after all, New Zealand's farmers expect nothing less.

General Manager's Report



The year ended 30 June 2013 has delivered another very good year for the New Zealand Farm Environment Trust (NZFE Trust) and the Ballance Farm Environment Awards. Interest in the work of the NZFE Trust and its flagship, the Ballance Farm Environment Awards has again been extremely satisfying and encouraging. Every year we seem to go from strength to strength and this past year has been no exception. The key objective of the NZFE Trust, "to promote sustainable farming practices to protect and enhance the environment", certainly strikes an accord with a wide audience and long may it continue.

This year we have seen two new sponsors on board, Donaghys and Meridian and we also introduced a new joint venture programme in conjunction with Beef + Lamb New Zealand, an Environmental Leaders Forum for the sheep and beef sector. This was structured along similar lines to the programme the NZFE Trust has operated in conjunction with DairyNZ for the past six years.

The fact that the NZFE Trust is able to attract new sponsors and is able to introduce joint venture programmes speaks volumes for the independence of the NZFE Trust and the work it has undertaken over many years. It has demonstrated, year after year, that it is serious about its key objective and the NZFE Trust has stuck to its knitting so to speak. Over the years there have been new initiatives but before they have been developed and introduced, they have been evaluated as to how they can "promote sustainable farming practices to protect and enhance the environment".

Another milestone this year was the 20th celebration of Gordon Stephenson's vision of an award programme. It was an idea, became a reality and then it became a success. Every time I hear Gordon speak of his vision, it serves as an inspiration to carry

on his work. At the National Sustainability Showcase in Hamilton in June this year, Gordon got to deliver an address to the 2013 Supreme Winners and invited guests.

One very salient point that Gordon referred to in his address was the reluctance of famers to enter the Ballance Farm Environment Awards and the fact that the standard response is the farm is not ready. In Gordon's opinion, that is the very best time to enter the awards, when the farm is not ready because entering at this time will be an invaluable experience to plan future development.

I have had so much feedback as to how inspired everyone was to have that opportunity to hear Gordon. It was only fitting that this year's National Sustainability Showcase should be held in Hamilton in the Waikato where it all started 20 years ago. Thanks for the opportunities Gordon.

And the opportunities keep on coming, a new region for the Ballance Farm Environment Awards programme. Welcome to Taranaki, it is a region we have had on the radar for some time now and to have it included provides us with more opportunities to "promote sustainable farming practices to protect and enhance the environment".

Resourcing

Last year I commented on a new initiative of introducing another position into the business of the NZFE Trust, that of an Executive Administrator position which was contracted to Clare Rosser.

This has been an excellent development as it has provided the NZFE Trust with much needed additional capabilities. Clare has been able to introduce a number of new procedures which have effectively streamlined the business operations of the NZFE Trust and the Ballance Farm Environment Awards.

Whilst Clare and I manage the overall business of the NZFE Trust, it must be recognised that without the immense contribution and commitment from the regions, our efforts would be in vain. We are indebted to those who front up year after year to do it again. Not only do we have a huge pool of people willing to make this commitment, they have been accepting of change and the introduction of new initiatives that help build upon the success of what has gone before them.

It has been estimated that the dollar amount for volunteer input per region is around \$50,000. This amounts to \$500,000 for the ten regions the Ballance Farm Environment Award now operate in. This amount does not feature in our annual accounts but it is something that needs to be recognised. It is something that is greatly valued.

And when you add to the mix, the input made by our stakeholders, over and above their financial commitment, the figure increases significantly.

Stakeholder Relationships

As I have referred to on many occasions, we have a great product in the Ballance Farm Environment Awards and the product is supported year after year by stakeholders that have strong business links to the rural sector.

The NZFE Trust previously determined that for the Ballance Farm Environment Awards programme, there would be the naming right sponsor and eight additional sponsors. It was considered this was the optimum number for the Ballance Farm Environment Awards programme in relation to benefits for sponsors, leveraging and management. It is pleasing to note that we have a full complement of sponsors.

It does not seem that long ago we were actively canvassing potential new sponsors, that situation has changed to where the NZFE Trust has, in recent times, fielded a number of queries from potential sponsors. That change is welcomed.

As well as the commercial sponsors of the Ballance Farm Environment Awards, we have established strong linkages and relationships with Regional Councils, and the Gisborne District Council, in all the regions in which the Ballance Farm Environment Awards operate. These relationships are immensely valuable as our business is very closely aligned to their business when it comes to "promoting sustainable farming practices to protect and enhance the environment". As key stakeholders, they too make staff available to participate in management committees and judging teams and the feedback I get from these people is they enjoy the experience of being part of what we deliver.

However, it is an area we need to monitor carefully. As you will be aware, there is a lot of talk what the shape of Local Government may look like in the future and the final shape could have an impact upon how many Regional Councils we have as stakeholders.

We are indeed fortunate to have great relationships with all the Regional Councils and the Gisborne District Council and it is pleasing to see the leveraging opportunities they are taking from their investment in the Ballance Farm Environment Awards. One Regional Council recently requested that their agreement with the NZFE Trust be modified so as to include the winners of their award making themselves available to Council staff for publicity purposes, including photographs, as soon as practicable after their win; the winner of their award presenting to at least one meeting of Council's Environment Management Committee as soon as is reasonable after their win; and the Supreme Winner for the region to present to Council's mid-year 'All Staff' meeting. This is an excellent leveraging opportunity and we will be looking to include this in all future Regional Council agreements.

As well as sponsors and Regional Councils, the NZFE Trust has also welcomed the involvement of Strategic Partners who have an affinity to our objective of "promoting sustainable farming practices to protect and enhance the environment". These strategic partners complement all aspects of the work of the NZFE Trust and they have a considerable amount of influence that we in turn can, and do leverage off.

Another sponsorship initiative the NZFE Trust has provided for is the introduction of Regional Sponsors. There are some businesses out there that have a specific regional business operation and because of this, they could not be considered for national sponsorship. The NZFE Trust has developed sponsorship agreements that are tailored for these particular businesses and we have been delighted to have their involvement to add value to the regional Ballance Farm Environment Awards.







We are currently looking at how to engage other regional specific businesses who have expressed a willingness to be part of the Ballance Farm Environment Awards. In the main, these are small to medium size businesses that do not fit the category of a regional sponsor such as those named above. We think there may be a way to include them but of paramount consideration is that their inclusion will not impact upon any of those key stakeholders who are significant investors in the NZFE Trust and the Ballance Farm Environment Awards.

There are a number of other agricultural focussed competitions that feature each year in the agriculture calendar and some of our stakeholders have sponsorship investments with them.

We do not see ourselves as competing with the other competitions such as the Dairy Industry Awards, the Ahuwhenua Maori Excellence in Farming Award and the Young Farmer of the Year. This past year I have had the opportunity to attend the finals of the Dairy Industry Awards and the Ahuwhenua Maori Excellence in Farming Awards and they have been amazing showcases for agriculture. So to our stakeholders who also invest in these competitions, thank you for supporting agriculture in such a positive manner.

A very big thank you to all personnel from stakeholder businesses associated with the NZFE Trust and the Ballance Farm Environment Awards for your commitment, not to mention your enthusiasm for what we do.

National Award

The National Award is now three years old and we have had three wonderful couples take the title and do an amazing job as Ambassadors for New Zealand agriculture, Grant and Bernie Weller in 2011, Blair and Jane Smith in 2012 and Craige and Roz Mackenzie in 2013

It would be fair to say the introduction of the National Award has provided a new level of interest for the Ballance Farm Environment Awards programme, be it from farmers, stakeholders or agribusinesses. It certainly was the right thing to do at the stage the Ballance Farm Environment Awards were at back in 2011. We did not have a lot to base the concept on but what did work to our advantage was the buy-in from stakeholders who all embraced the concept and got involved. The foresight of Trustees of the NZFE Trust to introduce a National Award has paid off as it has created a whole new awareness of the activities of the NZFE Trust as well as profiling agriculture in such a positive light. Grant and Bernie and Blair and Jane have appeared on Country Calendar; this kind of exposure of their business operations makes for compelling viewing. They have been great ambassadors for New Zealand agriculture and wonderful advocates for the work of the NZFE Trust.

A feature of the National Winner programme is what has now been fondly termed the 'Tour of Duty' through New Zealand to meet with NZFE Trust stakeholders. What has been so great about this is the willingness of stakeholder representatives to take the opportunity to arrange for the National Winners to meet with company personnel. The North Island part of the tour is a full on week of meetings and travel but it is one that everyone takes a great deal of pride and satisfaction in.

Blair and Jane Smith undertook a comprehensive tour through Korea, Taiwan, China and Singapore and their report, "Good Morning Asia" is a great read of a producer's view of the markets in those countries. It was a pleasure to work with Blair and Jane to put this tour together; we had some anxious moments as we dealt with uncertainties in South Korea and bird flu in China. I did enjoy their communications while they were on tour. I am indebted to personnel from Beef + Lamb New Zealand, Fonterra and MPI for assisting with the planning.

I look forward to working with Craige and Roz to maximise the rewards of being the 2013 National Winners.

Summary

As I have commented many times, each year delivers challenges and opportunities and it is a matter of how we deal with these. Having a proactive and dedicated group of Trustees means that the business is always well managed and well promoted. Core business features strongly in all planning decisions.

The year ahead will provide an exciting challenge of bringing the Taranaki region into the Ballance Farm Environment Awards programme. Farmers in that region will have the opportunity, through the awards programme, to highlight the great things they are doing to a wider audience.

I have commented that there could be some changes to Regional Council structures in New Zealand in the future. That too could be a challenge for the NZFE Trust as the linkages we have to existing Regional Councils are fundamental to how we deliver many of our outcomes. However, there will also be opportunities in any changes that are proposed and subsequently introduced.

One thing that will be a constant in what we continue to do is to showcase and highlight the achievements of those farmers who enter the Ballance Farm Environment Awards. Each year we have a new lot of entrants, some of whom have entered before, and they open themselves up to scrutiny by the teams of judges that visit their farms. However, the feedback we get from the entrants is that the judging process is beneficial in relation to their farming operations and their own personal development. Please refer to the testimonials from past entrants in this Annual Report and if you have the chance, encourage farmers to enter the Ballance Farm Environment Awards. And remember, if you get a response that the farm is not ready, remind them that is the time to enter.

Underpinning the successful outcomes we deliver each year is an amazing group of people who make a huge commitment to the Ballance Farm Environment

Awards programme, most of whom are volunteers. To Committee Chairs, Judging Coordinators, Regional Coordinators, regional management teams and judges as well as the many rural professionals who support us, thank you for making it happen and thank you for your continued support.

Also special thanks for the commitment that Clare Rosser has contributed to the NZFE Trust and the Ballance Farm Environment Awards since taking on the contract position of Executive Administrator, I have enjoyed the working relationship.

This past year saw NZFE Trust Trustee elections; the former Chairman, Jim Cotman stood down from that role. I look back with a great degree of admiration for the work that Jim undertook positioning the NZFE Trust and the Ballance Farm Environment Awards. The fact that both are highly professional and credible and command the attention of a whole host of people speaks volumes for what Jim was able to achieve.

I had the pleasure of working with Alistair Polson in our time together at Federated Farmers and it is great to re-establish that working connection through the NZFE Trust. Alistair's former role as New Zealand's Special Agricultural Trade Envoy has provided the NZFE Trust with additional "horsepower" and provided some new and valuable linkages. Many thanks to Alistair and Trustees for the support, trust and confidence they extend to Clare and me.

I know we are in for another good year and we will be working on the goal to have the Ballance Farm Environment Awards in all regions of New Zealand.

Treasurer's Report



It is my pleasure to report on the financial results of the New Zealand Farm Environment Trust. These accounts carry an independent audit certificate.

The NZFE Trust has enjoyed a successful year financially with increased partner support and a full complement of Ballance Farm Environment Award sponsors.

Income to administer and support the NZFE Trust activities increased in 2013 with Rabobank and DairyNZ partnering the Trust.

The NZFE Trust extended its sponsorship relationship with Beef + Lamb New Zealand to include a joint venture partnership in a Beef + Lamb Environmental Leaders Forum. This year's event, held in Wellington in April 2013, was smaller than initially projected and more cost efficient to operate. The NZFE Trust will carry forward \$30,000 of the Beef + Lamb contribution to operate the 2014 programme. The joint venture with Beef + Lamb New Zealand provides the NZFE Trust with a management fee for administering the programme.

The 2013 National Showcase was a larger event than normal and this is reflected in the event cost. A portion of the Ballance Farm Environment Awards sponsor funding contributes towards the cost of the Showcase and appears as an income in the NZFE Trust Divisional Statement and an expense in the Ballance Farm Environment Awards Statement.

Trustees approved funding in two areas to add value to the people resources that underpin the NZFE Trust activities. All Judging Coordinators, Regional Coordinators and Committee Chairs were funded to attend the National Sustainability Showcase. This provided an opportunity for the key regional personnel of the awards to have a national perspective of the very important role they play in

the regions and to celebrate their contribution and success.

The second investment was the inaugural meeting of past Supreme Winners to discuss and workshop the formation of an Alumni association. This was held in Hamilton prior to the National Sustainability Showcase. The NZFE Trust will continue to provide support as the Alumni association develops a document to support and guide the direction of their organisation.

The NZFE Trust operational expenses increased by 49% from 2012 with all areas showing an increase. The Alumnus and Beef + Lamb Environmental Leaders Forum were new expenditure items and the National Sustainability Showcase has been noted above. Clare Rosser has completed her first full year in the new role of Executive Administrator and is responsible for a number of areas of NZFE Trust administration which are recorded under Administration. Clare now manages the NZFE Trusts accounts, the website, assists with the administration of the NZFE Trust activities and is the National Administrator for the Ballance Farm Environment Awards. Accounting services and website management were previously out sourced. The website has had a revamp over the last two years and is kept up to date with regular and accurate updates on the NZFE Trust and Ballance Farm Environment Awards activities.

The cost of governance has increased with an extra trustee meeting held, teleconferencing and a reimbursement to Trustees who self-drive to meetings. The Treasurer's position received a reimbursement to acknowledge the expenses this role incurs.

At the beginning of 2013 the NZFE Trust changed its bankers to Rabobank New Zealand Limited.

Ballance Farm Environment Awards

The Ballance Farm Environment Awards have benefited from the support of a full complement of award sponsors with the addition of Donaghys and Meridian in 2013. Regional Council support remains the same as 2012. The NZFE Trust welcomed Alliance Group as regional sponsors for the Otago and Southland regions, the Waikato River Authority for the Waikato region and the continued regional sponsorship of Zespri for the Bay of Plenty region.

Regional income has been generated from ticket sales to attend the award functions in the regions. These funds are available for regions to grow the awards.

Regional expenses increased just over 9% with DVD, printing and stationery costs slightly reduced and coordination expenses increased. The 2013 budget allowed for a reimbursement for the Judging Coordinators in the seven regions the NZFE Trust directly funds. These positions are voluntary and the reimbursement is to provide some recompense for the administrative expenses that are incurred in the role.

The cost of coordination also reflects the addition of the National Regional Coordinator position filled by Clare Rosser. Clare has provided the regions with regular budget updates and worked to assist the regions in fully utilising their budgets to achieve a consistent standard of delivery for the award evenings across all the regions. Not every investment has a return that can be immediately measured in dollars and the development of the National Coordinator role is, in part, that kind of investment. This is a new era for the awards and while some regions have adjusted and tweaked their events and budgets to meet a nationally consistent standard this year, Clare is committed to supporting and assisting all regions to grow their awards.

The Combined Statement of Financial Performance shows a net surplus for the year of \$73,881. \$30,000 is being held for the Beef and Lamb NZ programme leaving \$43,881 as the true net surplus.

Trustees have set a reserve fund that will allow the NZFE Trust to keep operating and provide the same professional programmes and activities should sponsors or partners change. The fund also provides protection for the investment of the remaining sponsors and supporters and allows the NZFE Trust to develop partnerships or business opportunities that assist the development and growth of farmers' environmental leadership.

The Taranaki region will join the Ballance Farm Environment Awards programme in 2014 and Trustees have approved support for the establishment of this region from the reserve fund.

I wish to thank David Natzke and Clare Rosser for their diligent and professional management of the NZFE Trust's financial business.

Thanks to NZFE Trust's accountants, Accountants on London (Hamilton NZ) and the NZFE Trust auditor, Staples Rodway (Hamilton, NZ).

The NZFE Trust is indebted to the partners, sponsors and Regional Councils who continue to support the NZFE Trust activities and the considerable volunteer support of regional chairs, management committees, judging coordinators and judges who deliver the Ballance Farm Environment Awards.

National Judging Coordinator's Report



The year was characterised by attention to a lot of issues which could be best described as house keeping.

Communication lines were identified as needing improvement. It is fair to say some Judging Coordinators considered they were not in the communication loop as much as they wished. As a result of this, there was discussion at a Judging Coordinators meeting in Wellington and new processes have been introduced to build upon the all important need for timely and effective communications.

All changes around judging are now signed off by the National Judging Coordinator before they are implemented and Judging Coordinators are given the chance to comment on changes and put forward suggestions for improvements.

Improved communication can come from Judging Coordinators attending other region's functions. This has been offered and will be encouraged for the next round of awards.

As each year goes by, regions develop their own "twist" on the judging process. There is nothing wrong with this and in fact it is healthy. By using the best of these developments we are able to improve the overall effectiveness of judging throughout the country. There are subtle examples of this such as adding sections for "production forestry and deer farming" to manuals and workbooks; how did we get this far without their inclusion already; through to other differences. Andrea Hanna, Judging Coordinator for the Waikato region has done a lot of work on some of these and must be thanked for that input.

How deeply the Ballance Farm Environment Awards judging process delves into financial performance and at what a stage is under consideration. A clear direction is being sought through consultation with the NZFE Trust and the regions.

In the main, all Judging Coordinators are happy with the recognition they have received from the NZFE Trust and see it as acknowledgement of the hard work they put in. It must be noted that it probably does not cover the true hours of time they invest.

The National Judging process to determine the 2013 National Winner ran smoothly. Warwick Cato and I found the farm visit stage challenging. This was due to the very high standard of entrants again this year. As a consequence of our on-farm visits, a more comprehensive assessment was given to the National Judging panel this year by Warwick and me. The National Judges are asking for more hard facts and numbers both from the National Judges that visit the farms and the regional feedback reports. This is mostly around production and financial reporting. This will be addressed before the next round of National Judging in 2014. Along with this, there is a need to think through a "succession plan" with regard to the farm visit made by members of the National Judging team judges.

In general the 2013 Regional Supreme Winners were happy with the process. Some still want more information about the process but that has a large amount to do with evaluating the information already provided. The feedback received from the 2013 Supreme Winners has been plentiful and suggested improvements will be introduced so as to build upon the overall judging process.

Clare Rosser and David Natzke have been absolutely committed to advancing and improving the complete judging package as well as the judging process and they, along with the regional Judging Coordinators must be thanked most sincerely.

Report on the Financial Statements

1 Statement of Accounting Policies

Reporting Entity

New Zealand Farm Environment Trust is a Discretionary Trust.

The financial statements of New Zealand Farm Environment Trust are general purpose financial statements which have been prepared according to Generally Accepted Accounting Practice in New Zealand (NZ GAAP).

The trust is involved in the business of Promotion and education of sustainable environmental farming practices.

Statement of Compliance and Basis of Preparation

The trust qualifies for differential reporting as it is not publicly accountable and is not large as defined in the Framework for Differential Reporting. The trust has taken advantage of all available differential reporting exemptions other than FRS 10 Statement of Cash Flows.

The accounting principles recognised as appropriate for the measurement and reporting of the Statement of Financial Performance and Statement of Financial Position on a historical cost basis are followed by the trust. The information is presented in New Zealand dollars.

Specific Accounting Policies

The following specific accounting policies which materially affect the measurement of the Statement of Financial Performance and Statement of Financial Position have been applied:

(a) Revenue

Revenue is recognised on an accruals basis.

(b) Trade Receivables

Trade Receivables are recognised at estimated realisable value.

(c) Property, Plant & Equipment

Property, Plant & Equipment are recognised at Cost less aggregate depreciation. Depreciation has been calculated using the maximum rates permitted by the Income Tax Act 2007. Gains and losses on disposal of fixed assets are taken into account in determining the operating result for the year.

(d) Income Tax

Trust is not subject to income tax pursuant to the Income Tax Act 2007.

(e) Goods and Services Taxation (GST)

Revenues and expenses have been recognised in the financial statements exclusive of GST except that irrecoverable GST input tax has been recognised in association with the expense to which it relates. All items in the Statement of Financial Position are stated exclusive of GST except for receivables and payables which are stated inclusive of GST.

(f) Changes in Accounting Policies

There have been no changes in accounting policies. All policies have been applied on a basis consistent with those from previous financial statements.

Increasingly the effects of dairy farming on both surface and groundwater and its impact on soil properties are factors the judges will consider. – \$1000 cash/product



PGG Wrightson Land and Life Award

The personal beliefs of pride and passion for the land will be a key part of the considerations as well as an element of demonstrating good farm safety practices. A community spirit will be evident, along with a very good relationship with external 'advice or support' from agribusiness people. Massey University Innovation Award

The Innovation Award is given in recognition of the identification and implementation of economically and environmentally sustainable farming systems. Exceptional Leadership Skills Impress Judges of Top Farm Environment Award



The outstanding communication and leadership skills demonstrated by Canterbury farmers Craige and Roz Mackenzie will serve them well in their new role as ambassadors for New Zealand agriculture.

The Mackenzies were declared National Winners of the 2013 Ballance Farm Environment Awards at a Sustainability Showcase hosted by the New Zealand Farm Environment Trust (NZFE Trust) in Hamilton on June 22.

They were surprised and delighted to be named winners of the Gordon Stephenson trophy, with Craige telling the audience of almost 400 people that he and Roz were "very, very honoured" to accept the award. "We look forward to being ambassadors for the coming year."

The Mackenzies thanked the judging panel, NZFE Trust and the sponsors of the Ballance Farm Environment Awards. They also acknowledged their family, business partners and their farming team. "And we want to thank the other entrants," said Roz. "We found it inspiring and motivating to share time with them."

The Mackenzies, who run an intensive cropping operation near Methven, were among nine regional supreme winners of the 2013 Ballance Farm Environment Awards vying for the National Winner title.

Simon Saunders, deputy chair of NZFE Trust and chair of the National Winner judging panel, said the Canterbury farmers were deserved winners of the Gordon Stephenson trophy. "Craige and Roz are a great team with outstanding communication and leadership skills."

He said the Mackenzies demonstrated exceptional leadership ability during the judging process, providing reasoned arguments and innovative ways to address many of the challenges facing New Zealand agriculture.

Members of the judging panel also commented on Craige and Roz's excellent farming practices and management of resources. "They are focusing on utilising their resources as efficiently as possible through the use of new technologies and innovation. They also understand the importance of protecting and improving their farm environment through biodiversity, shelter and riparian planting."

Simon said judges noted the impressive 'integration synergies' employed by the Mackenzies between their arable farm and the neighbouring dairy operation, which they own an equity share in. Judges also commented on the "passion and focus" shown by the other members of Craige and Roz's farming team.

The judging panel, which included Jacqueline Rowarth, Warwick Catto, Chris Kelly, Paul Lamont and Jamie Strang, faced a huge challenge in picking a National Winner from the outstanding line up of Supreme winners. Simon described all nine regional winners as "pioneers and explorers".

"These outstanding farmers set goals, long term strategic plans and have in-depth business plans. They understand the strengths and weaknesses, potential risks and opportunities of their business and physical resources. They are continually striving to set best practice and they achieve this by often being at the leading edge of innovation.

As they are usually the innovators and early adopters of new best practice, robust science and research is critical. They realise the need to reduce their environmental footprint, and efficiency is becoming a key driver. In essence they are striving to produce more from less."

Even though they won three category awards in their first time in the Ballance Farm Environment Awards, Jim and Marilyn Law know there is still plenty of work to be done on their coastal Wairarapa farm.

The Laws own Palliser Ridge, an 823ha (effective) sheep and beef operation spanning three properties near Pirinoa in southern Wairarapa.

Jim says they were initially reluctant to enter the competition because they felt the farm wasn't ready. But, encouraged by their fertiliser rep and the Greater Wellington Regional Council, they decided to "give it a whirl".

Jim says although it took some time to bring all the information together for their entry, it was a worthwhile exercise and the benefits of being involved in the competition were considerable.

"The judges made some very favourable comments about our business and they also offered constructive criticism, politely pointing out areas that we could improve on in future."

The Laws also focus heavily on the people side of the business, supporting their local community and encouraging their young staff into further education. Jim, a former corporate executive and past chairman of the Taratahi Agricultural Training Centre, believes education is crucial to the industry's future.

"I've worked in countries where young people have been denied educations and never reached their full potential. But if you give young people an education, you give them a chance."



Education is also a key driving force behind the Ballance Farm Environment Awards, and Jim says he and his team learnt much from being involved in the competition.

"I'd strongly recommend the Awards to other farmers. Most Kiwis tend to be modest and reluctant to put themselves out there, but this competition has a lot to offer those who give it a go."

Jim says while the judges had considerable expert knowledge "they certainly weren't professorial types and they were very easy to get on with".

"Overall, I'd say the competition is a very good experience and I'm glad we got involved."

Jim and Marilyn Law Entrants 2013 Greater Wellington Ballance Farm Environment Awards Entering the Ballance Farm Environment Awards provided Bay of Plenty orchardists Ben and Heidi Rosewarne with the perfect opportunity to review the direction of their business.

And they were pleased they did.

In the 2013 Bay of Plenty Ballance Farm Environment Awards (BFEA) - their first attempt at the competition – they picked up two category awards, as well as lots of free advice.

"It never hurts to take a good hard look at your business," says Ben.

"For us, being involved in the competition helped us to confirm we were on the right track with what we were doing."

The Rosewarnes run Blueberry Corner, a berry growing and retail business based just north of Whakatane. After recently expanding their operation they now grow about 6ha of blueberries, lha of strawberries and .5ha of raspberries.

Ben and Heidi were pleased to win the Hills Laboratories Harvest award because it provides a good endorsement of their growing system. They also picked up the PGG Wrightson Land and Life Award – a reflection of their people management ethos and community involvement.

Ben says entering the competition was relatively easy and it proved to be a rewarding process.



"Doing the paperwork was a really good exercise for us because it made us sit down and take a look at what we were doing and where we were going."

He admits to being a little nervous as he and Heidi awaited the arrival of the judges. But they were quickly put at ease.

"The judging process was pretty relaxed and the judges made some very good points. I think we got a lot out of it and we'd certainly be keen to have another crack in future."

Ben says he and Heidi would recommend the competition to other famers or growers.

"It's definitely worth going along for the ride.""


James and Ella moved onto the farm in 2008, initially working alongside James' parents Richard and Pamela.

Graeme Williams and Derry Stovell entered the 2013 Ballance Farm Environment Awards because they wanted to highlight the value of East Cape hill country.

Graeme and Derry farm 700ha (effective) 'Mangaroa', a steep hill-country property southwest of Tokomaru Bay.

They were encouraged to enter the competition by other farmers who asked them to represent the Gisborne region.

"We felt this place tells a real story," says Graeme.

"Most people think that erodible East Coast hill country should be in forestry, but we wanted to show that sheep and beef farms like this can make a sustainable economic return."

Around 58,000 trees have been planted on Mangaroa, mainly for erosion control, shelter and even stock feed.

Graeme says the Ballance Farm Environment Awards were "a great thing to be part of".

He says the judging was conducted in an informal

and enjoyable manner.

"The judges were there to listen to your story. I found the whole process very interesting."



Derry also enjoyed participating in the Awards and she and Graeme are now actively encouraging other farmers to enter the competition.

Graeme says the Awards play an important role in highlighting environmental issues and showcasing some of the good work being done on farms.

He says the competition gets important messages out to both rural and urban audiences.

"The majority of farmers are very aware of these issues and they know that being a good conservationist puts more money in your hip pocket."

Otago dairy farmers Terry and Jacqui Carr are always looking for ways to increase their farming knowledge.

Equity managers for the Argyll Dairy Farm Partnership, the Carrs regard farming competitions as a good way to benchmark themselves against other dairy farmers while also gaining valuable farm management information.

The Ballance Farm Environment Awards helped them do just that.

"We entered because we wanted to improve our knowledge of environmental issues and to pick up information that would help us grow our business in a sustainable way," says Jacqui.

Jacqui says their experience in the Ballance Farm Environment Awards provided reassurance that the business was addressing environmental issues in the correct manner.

"Being involved in the awards confirmed that we were doing the right thing," she says.

"Getting our entry together was a good exercise for us and the actual judging process was done in a very relaxed manner. It wasn't just the judges asking us questions, we were also able



to ask them questions and so we picked up a lot of information from them."

Jacqui says the expert judges made a number of good recommendations.

Jacqui says the feedback received from the judges was excellent.

"We felt it was a very worthwhile experience and we would certainly encourage other farmers to enter the competition. It's a great opportunity to increase your knowledge."

Terry and Jacqui Carr Entrants 2013 Otago Ballance Farm Environment Awards Participating in the Ballance Farm Environment Awards inspired Ken and Janine Hames to step up environmental work on their Northland farm.

Ken says they entered the awards to benchmark themselves against other farmers and "to see where we were at" in terms of environmental sustainability.

He and Janine, a vet at Ruawai, first entered the Northland Ballance Farm Environment Awards in 2010 and were thrilled to win two category awards.

"I guess it showed we were on the right track," says Ken, who runs an intensive bull finishing operation on 400ha at Paparoa, southeast of Dargaville.

He says the judging process motivated him to set a number of achievable goals over the next five years.

He has continued with an extensive waterway and bush fencing programme. Almost 60% of the riparian fencing is now complete and Ken plans to finish the rest over the next three years.

"We've had fairly low profitability in the sheep and beef sector, so you can't expect to do everything in year one. We've got to be realistic." Ken says he would certainly encourage other farmers to enter, even if they feel their farm is not ready.

"You are never going to have the perfect farm. It's always going to be a work in progress.



"Entering the awards is very worthwhile. The feedback from the judges is fantastic and it's a great experience meeting the other contestants and learning from them as well."

Ken says the 'journey' towards environmental sustainability is of huge importance to New Zealand agriculture.

"Farmers need to be aware that environmental issues associated with farming are here to stay. We have to position ourselves for the future and make sure everything we do is sustainable in the long-term."

King Country sharemilker Dean Marshall says there is nothing flashy about the way he farms. "I'm not a high-tech farmer. I just concentrate on getting the basics right."

Dean and wife Lucy sharemilk 350 cows on 'Paatara', a 158ha farm situated northeast of Taumarunui and owned by the Te Uranga B2 Incorporation.

Good environmental stewardship is a crucial feature of Te Uranga's operations, and the Trust and the Marshalls have always strived to improve sustainability on Paatara.

Dean says they entered the Horizons Ballance Farm Environment Awards because they wanted to get feedback on the operation "and gauge how we were doing compared to other farms".

He says winning the LIC Dairy Farm Award was a good endorsement of the management system employed on Paatara and the strong focus on sustainability. "We run a low input system that capitalises on New Zealand's ability to grow grass. Pasture management is key and the aim is to fully utilise whatever we can grow."

The Marshalls, now in their eleventh season with

Te Uranga, also strive to support their staff as much as possible. "We are full of encouragement for people who want to enter this industry."



Dean says being involved in the Ballance Farm Environment Awards was highly beneficial. "We got some great feedback from the judges and the whole judging process was very constructive."

He and Lucy also enjoyed mingling with other competitors on Awards night. "It was good to find out what other people are doing on their farms."

He says he would certainly encourage other farm owners and sharemilkers to enter the competition. "Lucy and I learnt a lot from it. If you really want to make it worthwhile, the key thing is to be open and honest with the judges about what you are doing and what you hope to achieve."

Dean and Lucy Marshall and Te Uranga B2 Incorporation Entrants 2013 Horizons Ballance Farm Environment Awards Entering the Ballance Farm Environment Awards helped a fledgling Southland dairy operation measure its progress as a successful and sustainable farming business.

South Coast Dairy Ltd, an equity partnership between five families, owns 202ha between Curio Bay and the Haldane Estuary in Eastern Southland. The former sheep and beef farm was converted four years ago and now milks 385 cows on a 135ha milking platform.

Mindful of the farm's location in a sensitive coastal area, the owners have made a big effort to mitigate the environmental impacts of dairying, with extensive riparian fencing and planting work conducted following consultation with the Department of Conservation, Environment Southland, Landcare Trust and Fish and Game.

Equity partners Chris and Lynsey Stratford, who oversee the day to day management of the farm, milked 380 cows last year, achieving production of 437kgMS/cow.

Lynsey says entering the competition provided the business with a good opportunity to benchmark economic and environmental progress.

While some farmers are reluctant to enter the competition because they feel their farm isn't ready, Lynsey says the owners of South Coast Dairy Ltd were keen to enter because they wanted to build knowledge and find out if they were on the right track.

"The main benefit for us was the ability to get feedback from a diverse group of people with different skill sets. We felt we had a lot to gain by entering early rather than waiting for a few more years."



Lynsey says she and Chris enjoyed the interactive judging process.

"It was just like have a friendly discussion as you go around the farm. It was very much a collaborative approach because the judges asked us questions and we were able to ask them questions. We got a lot of good feedback and the whole process gave us great food for thought."

She says the judges provided a valuable outside perspective of the operation.

"The Awards night was another highlight because we got to meet the other competitors and be inspired by their stories."

She says she and Chris would definitely encourage other farmers to participate in the Ballance Farm Environment Awards.

"It's an empowering competition. You've got nothing to lose by entering."

"It's a fun competition with a serious side."

That's how Mid Canterbury farmer Philip Wareing describes the Ballance Farm Environment Awards.

"They are open to all farmers. You don't have to have the perfect farm or lots of tertiary qualifications to get involved," he says.

The winner, or their nominee, will receive a fees scholarship to further their professional development through a short course (subject to entry requirements), or period of private study, at Massey University.
